



Notice of Emergency Decision and Order

Pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17815, and Government Code section 11460.40, the Department of Cannabis Control (Department) is providing notice to LACC, LLC dbas Weedyy and CCG Delivery (Licensee) and owners Alfred Abramian and Vartan Karagezyan, that at 5:00 p.m. on February 23, 2026, the attached Emergency Decision and Order will become effective. The Emergency Decision and Order suspends LACC, LLC dbas Weedyy and CCG Delivery, license number **C9-0000683-LIC**, and orders the Licensee and its owners to cease all commercial cannabis activity pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17815, subdivision (b)(1), at the following location:

You have the right to be heard before the Director of the Department of Cannabis Control (Director), or his designee, regarding the allegations in the Emergency Decision and Order prior to the effective date of the Emergency Decision and Order pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17815, subdivision (h), when practicable. If you would like to be heard before the Director, or his designee, please submit a written request by email to janet.ruiz@cannabis.ca.gov. Unless the Department receives your request by 5:00 p.m. on February 26, 2026, you will be deemed to have waived your right to be heard before the Director, or his designee.

If requested, the hearing before the Director, or his designee, will be held on February 27, 2026, at 2:00 p.m., via online video conferencing. You may submit documentation regarding the allegations in the Emergency Decision and Order prior to or during the hearing, if one is requested.

Within 10 days after the effective date of the Emergency Decision and Order, the Department will file an Accusation on the charges and allegations set forth in the Emergency Decision and Order. The adjudicative proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with chapter 5 (commencing with Section 11500) of part 1 of division 3 of title 2 of the Government Code.

Upon issuance of the Emergency Decision and Order, you have the right under Government Code section 11460.80 to obtain judicial review of the Emergency Decision and Order. The Emergency Decision and Order shall remain in effect until such time as the Accusation has been fully adjudicated or upon issuance of the final decision and order following judicial review.

Emergency Decision and Order

Pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17815, and article 13 (commencing with section 11460.10) of Chapter 4.5 of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, the Department of Cannabis Control (DCC) issues the following Emergency Decision and Order:

The Department of Cannabis Control hereby SUSPENDS the license of LACC, LLC dbas Weedyy and CCG Delivery, license number C9-0000683-LIC (Licensee), and orders Licensee, and owners Alfred Abramian and Vartan Karagezyan, to **CEASE ALL COMMERCIAL CANNABIS ACTIVITY, CEASE ALL MOVEMENT OF CANNABIS GOODS TO AND FROM THE PREMISES, and CEASE ALL SALES OF CANNABIS GOODS**, at the following location or any other location or activity associated with the license, **effective at 5:00 p.m. on February 23, 2026:**

This order is based on an immediate danger to the public health, safety, and welfare. Specifically, as set forth in the attached Declaration of Russell Poag, there is evidence that the Licensee is engaging in the illegal diversion of cannabis or cannabis goods. The Department of Cannabis Control has determined that this order is necessary to prevent the sale, transfer, or transport of illegal cannabis goods in possession of the Licensee and to prevent the illegal diversion of cannabis goods, based on the following:

- The Licensee conducted commercial cannabis activities beyond what was authorized by the license, beyond the premises licensed for the activity, and failed to store all cannabis and cannabis products solely within the licensed premises, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 4, sections 15000.1, subdivision (c) and 15000.7, subdivision (a).
- The Licensee failed to accurately record all commercial cannabis activity in the California Cannabis Track and Trace system (CCTT) by falsifying business records by recording delivery sales as in-person sales, failing to record receipt of cannabis or cannabis products in CCTT within 24 hours, failing to record sales or donations of cannabis products in CCTT within 24 hours, failing to create delivery inventory ledgers prior to delivery employees leaving the licensed premises, and failing to record delivery information in CCTT by the end of the calendar day on which the delivery was completed, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 4, sections 15047.2, subdivisions (b) and (d), 15049, subdivisions (b)(1) and (b)(8), and 15049.3, subdivisions (a), (b), and (c).



- The licensee failed to reconcile inventory at least once every 30 days, failed to maintain an accurate record of inventory or provide DCC with such record, failed to account for all inventory, failed to verify that the physical inventory was consistent with the recorded inventory, resulting in 7,616 units of cannabis products unaccounted for, and failed to retain records of inventory reconciliation and make those records available to DCC, in violation of California Code of Regulation, title 4, sections 15048.1, subdivision (a)(8), 15051, subdivision (a)(1), 15423, and 15424, subdivisions (a), (b), and (c).
- The Licensee failed to comply with DCC regulations governing retail delivery sales; specifically Licensee failed to conduct retail sales exclusively by delivery, failed to provide evidence of compliance with delivery employee requirements, failed to ensure that a third-party technology service provider did not use the Licensee's license number, failed to ensure deliveries were made only to physical addresses, failed to show compliance with delivery vehicle requirements, failed to ensure that delivery employees had a delivery inventory ledger before leaving the licensed premises, maintained a log of all stops, and received a delivery request receipt prior to arrival at any delivery location, and failed to prepare delivery request receipts for each delivery of cannabis goods, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 4, sections 15414, subdivision (a), 15415, 15415.1, subdivision (b)(3), 15416, 15417, 15418, subdivisions (d), (e) and (f), and 15420.
- The Licensee failed to cooperate with and participate in a Department investigation against the Licensee by providing contradictory, misleading, or false information and fabricated documents such that Licensee's actions actively impeded the investigation, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17800, subdivision (b).


This circumstance requires immediate action by the Department of Cannabis Control to protect the public health, safety, or welfare, and prevent the illegal diversion of cannabis goods from entering the cannabis market.

While the license is suspended, you must comply with the provisions of California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 17816 and conspicuously and continuously display the Notice of Suspension, provided with this Notice, on the exterior of the premises referenced in this Notice. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in further disciplinary action.

You have the right to be heard before the Director of the Department of Cannabis Control, or his designee, regarding the allegations in the Emergency Decision and Order, prior to the effective date of the Emergency Decision and Order, when practicable. The attached Notice of Emergency Decision and Order provides details on how to request a hearing, as well as a hearing date should one be requested.

Within 10 days after the effective date of the Emergency Decision and Order, the Department will file an Accusation on the charges and allegations set forth in the Emergency Decision and Order. The adjudicative proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with chapter 5 (commencing with Section 11500) of part 1 of division 3 of title 2 of the Government Code.

The Emergency Decision and Order, effective at 5:00 p.m. on February 23, 2026, shall remain in effect until such time as the Accusation has been fully adjudicated or upon issuance of the final decision and order following judicial review if obtained pursuant to Government Code section 11460.80.
